Objective:

Students will explore the layers and movement of the ocean using painted paper, bright colors, and simple shapes. This project focuses on color blending, collage, and environmental awareness. Students will build a mixed media seascape in layers, beginning with the sky and water, and adding coral, seaweed, and vibrant fish. The final artwork highlights the ocean's beauty and inspires students to think about why keeping our oceans clean and colorful is important.

- White and colored construction paper
- Tempera or acrylic paint
- Cardboard for scraping
- Neon oil pastels
- Oil pastels or paint markers (for fish details)
- Scissors
- Glue
- Coral and seaweed drawing reference sheets

Day	Direction		
1	Teacher will demonstrate how to blend shades of blue and white, as well as indigo, green, and pink, using cardboard scraping or brushes. Students will create painted paper for the ocean using cool colors and another paper using shades of brown to represent sand. These papers will be set aside to dry for layering the next day.		
2.	Teacher will explain how to divide the paper into sections and demonstrate how to use neon oil pastels to create thick, wavy lines at the top to represent the movement of wind in the sky. Students will divide their background into four parts, with the top section reserved for sky texture. They will then rip their painted ocean paper into strips (about 2–3 fingers wide) and glue them in layers on the remaining bottom sections to form the ocean.		
3	Teacher will show how to use reference sheets to draw seaweed and model cutting small paper scraps for coral, emphasizing contrast against the blue background. Students will use brightly colored painted paper (avoiding blue) to cut 3–5 inch coral shapes and glue them onto the ocean. Using oil pastels, students will draw 2–3 seaweeds, each on a different colored paper using a different color pastel, then cut and glue them into their scene.		
4	Teacher will guide students through the process of creating small fish from construction paper (cut to approx. 1" x 2"), adding detail with paint markers or oil pastels. Students will create 7–10 fish with varied shapes, patterns, and colors. Once complete, they will cut and glue them into their seascape to bring the underwater world to life.		

Steps for the Lesson



Steps for the Lesson

Step	Directions	lmage
1	Students will create two types of painted paper—one using cool blues, whites, and indigos for the ocean, and another with browns for sand—by scraping paint with cardboard.	
2	Students will divide their background into four parts. In the top section, they'll draw thick neon pastel lines to represent wind. Then, they'll tear their blue painted paper into strips and glue them down to create ocean layers.	



3 Students will cut 3x5 inch pieces of brightly painted paper to create coral and use oil pastels to draw coral and seaweed on contrasting colors. They will cut and glue everything onto the layered ocean background. 4 Students will cut small rectangles of construction paper into fish shapes, decorate them with patterns, and glue 7–10 fish into their collage to complete their ocean scene.
